

Barriers to conducting research with CYP with LLC/LTI include:



Time & funding



Clinician's attitudes towards research



Clinician gatekeeping



Ethical approval processes

KEY FINDINGS:

SOLUTIONS

Solutions for overcoming barriers to research include:

- Having a well thought-out methodology with broad inclusion criteria
- Involving CYP, their families and their clinicians early in the research process
- Seeking advice from others who have been through the ethical and regulatory approval processes
- Embedding researchers in clinical teams.

Researchers were more likely to receive a favourable opinion if they attended the Research Ethics Committee (REC) meeting where their research was being reviewed.

A favourable review was never given if the research team were not present at the meeting.


